So today, as parties discuss how to combat the greatest challenge of our time, know that as custodians, indigenous peoples have shown that this CAN be done. For we have done it before.

We believe that beyond every horizon lies undiscovered, or rather, untapped opportunities and solutions. In the face of climate change, the custodians of this planet will continue to do what we have always done. We will continue to listen to Mother Earth, and uphold our traditional knowledge. Because this is where solutions lie.

Yesterday evening was the culmination of a process that identified a pathway to operationalise the Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform. Yesterday was also a day, when parties finally listened to indigenous voices.

We have witnessed a new fire, a fire of willingness and inclusion, cooperation between Indigenous Peoples and Parties in good faith, and we have received tremendous support from the COP presidency, and SBSTA chair.

So as we all continue to navigate a way forward on climate change, it is our profound wish that the light from that fire, as well as the direction from our ancestors, will illuminate the work of the coming days to ensure that we are all able to paddle this waka in the same direction.
